WWC & HIGHER EDUCATION TERMINOLOGY

Add/Drop Period:

The time when you can add or drop from a course for the semester or term. The official Add/Drop period ends on the first Sunday (at 11:59 p.m.) at the end of the first week of the term or semester. During this period, courses may be added or dropped. Following this period, no student is permitted to register for a new course. You may drop courses from your schedule via MyWWC. Courses dropped during this period do not appear on student records. Students not present at the first class meeting may lose their place in the course if it has a waiting list.

Asheville Farm School:

Warren Wilson College started as the Asheville Farm School in 1894, became a coed junior college in 1942, and transitioned to the four-year Warren Wilson College in the mid 1960s.

Cabinet:

The Cabinet consists of senior administrators who support the President and manage College employees.

Center for Experiential Learning (CEL):

Located in the Log Cabin, this center includes the Work Program Office, Community Engagement, and Global Engagement.

Center for Integrated Advising and Careers (CIAC):

Located in Jensen Hall, CIAC includes Integrated Advising Coaches and Career Development staff.

Commencement:

Commencement is the ceremony in which degrees or diplomas are conferred on graduating students. This important tradition marks the culmination and celebration of a student's time at Warren Wilson College.

Craft:

Students can participate in Craft programs through the Craft Minor and related work crews, including Blacksmithing, Fine Woodworking, and Fiber Arts.

Credit Hours:

Units that the College uses to indicate that a student has completed and passed courses that are required for a degree. A minimum of 128 credit hours is required for the baccalaureate degree, with a minimum GPA of 2.00.

College Mace:

A Commencement tradition, the mace represents the authority of the College President and is carried at the head of academic processions by the Chief Marshall, typically the Provost. The Warren Wilson mace was commissioned in 1978 by College President Reuben Holden and created by Swannanoa artist Dirck Cruser. Carved of walnut, the mace bears the symbols of the College: the mountains, the valley, the river, the owl, and the spade. The distinctive curves and carving also form two W's for "Warren Wilson."

Course Load:

The number of courses or credits a student takes during a specific term.

Dust Bowl:

The parking lot located behind DeVries Athletic Center.

Dodge House:

Located across from Gladfelter Hall, this historic campus building contains Student Life offices including First Year Experience, Residence Life, Transportation Crew, and the Queer Resource Center.

Faculty Advisor:

Along with your Integrated Advising Coach (IAC), once you decide on and declare a major, you choose an additional advisor from the faculty in your major program. This Faculty member becomes your major advisor, who assists you with academic planning and selecting classes.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid):

Application used by U.S. citizens and permanent residents to apply for financial aid from U.S. federal and state governments. International students are not eligible for U.S. government aid, but schools may ask international students to submit a FAFSA to determine financial need. (Note: A social security number is required to complete the FAFSA.)

The Farm:

The Warren Wilson Farm realizes the College's philosophy of integrated work, community engagement, and academics. Our student-run, mixed crop and livestock operation, although educational in nature, is a working farm with a commitment to sustainable farming practices. The Farm cultivates student leaders with a strong work ethic, continuing an agricultural tradition since 1894 in the Swannanoa Valley.

Financial Aid:

All types of money offered to a student to help pay tuition, fees, and other educational expenses. Financial aid can include loans, grants, scholarships, assistantships, fellowships, and work-study jobs.

General Education Requirements:

Mandatory courses that all students are required to complete to earn a degree.

Glad:

Short for Gladfelter Hall, which houses the dining hall, Cowpie Cafe, Student Activities and other student organization space, the ID Card Center, the Mailroom, and space for studying and gathering.

Global Engagement Office (GEO):

The Global Engagement Office acts as the international hub of Warren Wilson. GEO advises students on their plans to do a semester or year abroad, implements faculty-led courses abroad, supports visiting international scholars, serves as a hub for international student advising, and so much more.

Grant:

A type of financial aid that consists of an amount of free money given to a student, often by the federal or a state government, a company, a school, or a charity. A grant does not have to be repaid. "Grant" is often used interchangeably with "scholarship."

Integrated Advising Coaches (IAC):

Your IAC is your go-to person for academic and career assistance. The staff can assist with: selecting classes, choosing majors and minors, completing graduation requirements, exploring careers, applying to internships and jobs...and more!

Liberal Arts:

Academic studies of subjects in the humanities, social sciences and the sciences, with a focus on general knowledge, in contrast

to a professional or technical emphasis. “Liberal arts” is often used interchangeably with “liberal arts and sciences” or “arts and sciences.”

Matriculation Ceremony:

Matriculation is a formal process of becoming a student or enrolling into a college. This event marks the moment when all new students (both first-years and transfers) officially become part of the Warren Wilson family.

Merit Aid / Merit Scholarships:

A type of financial aid awarded by a college or university to students who have demonstrated special abilities or talents, regardless of their financial need. Most merit aid has specific requirements if students want to continue to receive it, such as maintaining a certain GPA.

Need-Based Financial Aid:

Financial aid that is awarded to eligible students based on their FAFSA information to lower the full cost of attending a specific college or university, rather than specifically because of their grades or other merit.

Owls:

The Warren Wilson College mascot. It's why you hear the cheer “hootie hoo” across campus, why our annual scholarship event is called a “Parliament,” and why owl art is so widely displayed across campus.

Peer Group Leaders (PGLs):

Peer Group Leaders are returning students who partner with each First Year Seminar (FYS) class to collaborate with FYS instructors and provide broad academic support.

Pfaff Cup:

The Alton F. Pfaff Cup, Warren Wilson College's highest honor given to a graduating senior, is awarded during the Honors & Awards Ceremony, which takes place the day before Commencement in May each year.

Prerequisite:

A required course that must be completed before a student is allowed to enroll in a more advanced course.

Priority Date:

The date by which an application must be received in order to be given full consideration. This can apply to admissions, financial aid and on-campus housing. After the priority date passes, applications may be considered on a case-by-case or first-come-first-served basis.

Probation:

A status or period of time in which a student's academic performance, work performance, or conduct is considered unsatisfactory according to the college, and they must improve their performance.

Academic Probation:

Students who earn below 67% of attempted credits at the completion of one semester receive a warning notice that they must improve their credit progress by the end of two semesters, regardless of GPA. Students who do not complete at least 67% of credits overall for two semesters in succession will be placed on academic probation.

Work Probation:

Work Probation is a stated period of time during which further violation of the Work Program and work crew rules/expectations could result in suspension from the program. Work Probation results automatically when a student accumulates four or more conduct points.

Provost:

The senior academic officer of the college who oversees all academic policies and curriculum-related matters.

Queer Resource Center (QRC):

Located in Dodge House, the Queer Resource Center is committed to building a campus culture at Warren Wilson that honors the dignity and value of people of all genders and sexual orientations. The QRC is a safe space for Queer students to be in community with each other.

Registrar:

The college official who is responsible for registering students and keeping their academic records, such as transcripts. The Registrar's Office is located in the second floor of Laursen.

Resident Assistants (RAs):

RAs are upper-level students who live in-residence providing support, programming, and events.

Room and Board:

Housing and meals. "Room and board" is typically one of the costs that colleges and universities will list in their annual estimated cost of attendance, in addition to tuition, fees, and textbooks and supplies. Students living on campus will be required to have a meal plan to use at campus dining facilities.

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP): In order to maintain financial aid eligibility, students must meet the financial aid SAP policy. SAP is evaluated at the end of each semester. Those students who do not meet the minimum SAP standard are placed on Financial Aid Warning. If at the end of the warning semester the student is still not meeting the SAP policy requirements, they will be placed on Financial Aid Suspension. Students on suspension have the right to appeal to the Financial Aid Office to regain eligibility of aid. For questions regarding SAP please contact the Financial Aid Office.

Semesters:

Periods of study that divide the academic year into two equal segments of approximately 15 to 18 weeks each.

Spiritual Life:

The Spiritual Life Center develops spiritual life and social justice programs that serve the community within and around Warren Wilson, encourages and supports student religious and spiritual practice groups, educates the campus about opportunities to engage in spiritual life and social justice events both on and off campus, and collaborates with other crews for programming.

Syllabus:

The syllabus is your guide to a course and what will be expected of you in that course. Generally it will include course policies, rules and regulations, grading system, required texts, and a schedule of assignments.

Transfer Credit:

Credit granted toward a degree on the basis of studies completed at another college or university. For instance, students who transfer from a community college to a four-year college may earn some transfer credit.

Tuition:

An amount of money charged by a school per term, per course or per credit, in exchange for instruction and training. Tuition generally does not include the cost of textbooks, room and board, and other fees.

Warren Hugh Wilson:

The College's namesake, Warren Wilson was a pioneering sociologist, a social reformer focused on rural communities, and a leader within the Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The Church honored him when they named the Warren H. Wilson Junior Vocational College in 1942, and the College kept his name when it transitioned to a four-year school in the 1960s.

Wilson Inclusion, Diversity and Equity (WIDE) Office:

Warren Wilson College's Inclusion, Diversity, & Equity Office (WIDE) is devoted to creating and upholding a culture on campus that is sustainable, supporting people striving individually, collectively, and meaningfully towards intercultural ingenuity. The Office seeks to provide learning opportunities through consulting, training and workshops, advisement of identity-based clubs, crisis management, student-centered programming, provident opportunities for processing of concepts of race/ethnicity, and building out inclusive spaces.

Withdraw:

To formally stop participating in a course or attending a university.

White Pine Seedling:

The tree sapling that students receive with each degree represents a new beginning. Just as each graduate leaves the College to go, lay down roots, and grow, the graduate is encouraged to plant this tree away from campus to represent their mark as a Warren Wilson graduate in the greater world.

Work Program Office (WPO):

The Work Program provide learning opportunities through work crew placements that are focused on a student-centered experience and career preparation. The WPO staff provides support and resources for any work-related questions or concerns. Students living on campus are required to be on a work crew each semester.

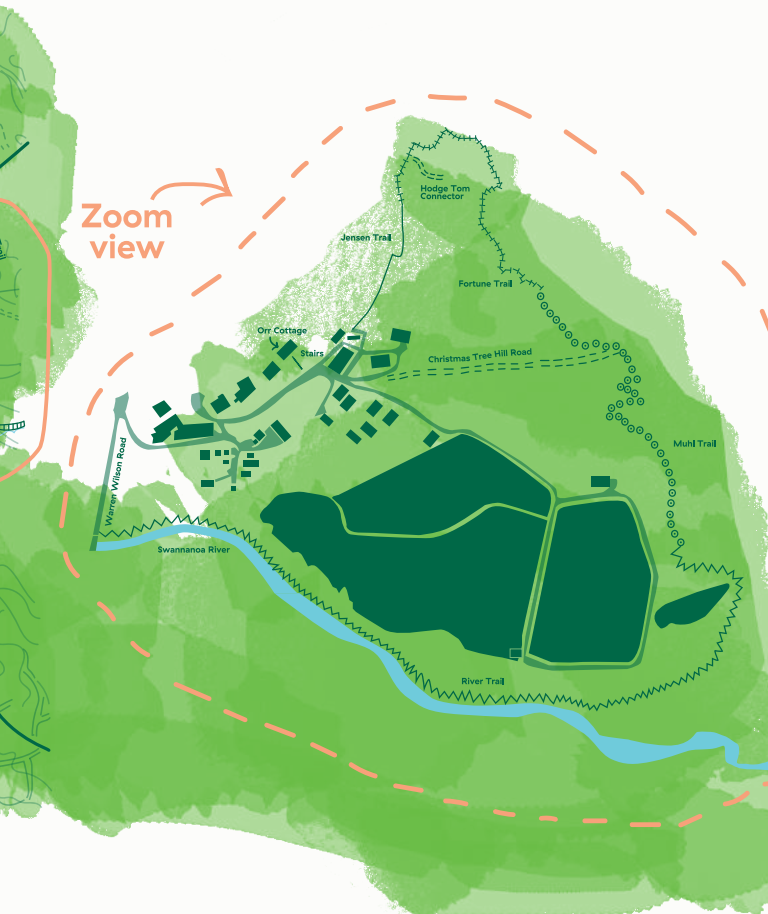
